The South Australian First
Nations Voice to Parliament
or SA First Nations Voice,
is a state-level initiative led
by the South Australian
Government to provide a
connected, direct and
independent line of
communication for
Aboriginal and Torres Strait
Islander people living in
South Australia to the South
Australian Parliament and
the Government.

The SA First Nations Voice will be made up of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, elected by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people of South Australia.

They will represent their communities and provide advice on laws, policies, and programs through direct communication with key decision-makers.

The SA First Nations Voice will enable more informed and inclusive decision-making about the issues that matter most to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their communities.



6 REGIONS

Each region has its own Local Voice

Local Voice representatives are elected by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in the region
